Railroad Update

You've probably noticed that rail traffic along our neighborhood's eastern fringe has crept up year by year. Unfortunately, this trend is only slated to increase, and here's why: That line, running parallel to Jacobus Avenue, reaches all the way south to the shipping port in Guaymas, Sonora.

Guaymas lies a few hours south of Puerto Peñasco, on the Gulf of California. And the Guaymas port was recently expanded to handle even bigger ships with ever-more cargo. Presumably, much of that cargo will reach the U.S. by rail, traveling a line that ultimately shadows the east side of Armory Park.

But that's not all. The whistles on these trains also seem to be growing louder. Meanwhile, there's heightened concern about toxic cargoes traveling by rail—worries that were crystallized last summer during a derailment on the curving track near 16th Street and Euclid Avenue. From what we're told, no toxic chemicals were onboard. So perhaps we dodged a bullet this time. But there's always a next time.

The good news is that the APNA board in general—and the board's transportation committee in particular—is working hard on strategies to reduce train noise, and gain a better understanding of what hazardous cargoes are putting us at risk. For instance, we'll soon be traipsing around the neighborhood with decibel meters, charting noise levels at various

locations, and compiling data to be shared with city officials. Committee members are researching noise-reduction materials that can be applied to buildings nearest the tracks, and learning about quieter types of whistles. We've similarly been in contact with urban planners at the University of Arizona, to learn how other communities are dealing with train issues.

Short of rerouting the trains far from our homes, we hope to eventually create a whistle-free zone for those passing nearby.

It's a huge challenge. But these trains already impact the quality of life in our neighborhood, and could present a deadly risk. Developing strategies to face that challenge is a big no-brainer. And if you have any suggestions, we're all ears—at least when a train isn't roaring by! •

St. Andrew's Church: Catering to All Your Needs

After Anne Bowen brought the Southern Arizona AIDS Foundation's "Food for Life" Program to St. Andrew's Kitchen, we have produced more than one million meals over the past 15 years for people living with HIV/AIDS. That program has now moved out of our kitchen to larger quarters. In 2006, we began the Neighbor's Feeding Neighbors program, in conjunction with the Armory Park Neighborhood Association, in order to feed those in need living within the neighborhood. The program was, and still is, funded by the association, Episcopal Community Services, and many private donations. This past November, A.P.N.A. recently had a home tour and a portion of the proceeds went to our program. We would like to extend a heartfelt "thank you" for their continued support and dedication to our food ministries and the Armory Park community as a whole.

With such drastic cuts to SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), we have recently enlarged the boundaries of Neighbors Feeding Neighbors to include all of the downtown area in order to better serve those in need. In anticipation of more clients, we have started a catering service in order to raise money for our much-needed food assistance programs. So far we have hosted gatherings and prepared menus for many different types of events including weddings, meetings, luncheons, galas and auctions. All the proceeds from St. Andrew's Catering go toward the church and Neighbors Feeding Neighbors, and we are very excited about this new possible stream of income, which will help us to expand our outreach to the community.

The rental of our Parish Hall is also available with or without our catering services. Our church building is a gem located in the heart of downtown Tucson, in the center of the Armory Park neighborhood. It is perfect for any group event, whether large or small, religiously affiliated or not. Whether a five-course

meal is required or you just need a place to have tea and chat, St. Andrew's caters to that.
