Five Points Pedestrian Improvement Project

The improvements in this project are centered around the southern gateway to Tucson at Five Points (the 6th Avenue, Stone Avenue, 18th Street intersection). Project coordinators determined that, in the Five Points area, the pedestrian-level lighting was lacking and visibility was poor. They also noted that sidewalks were discontinuous and there were inadequate ADA access ramps at intersections. Additionally, the project coordinators suggested that the "gateway" and four adjoining neighborhoods lacked community cohesion.

The primary project goals are to fill in the sidewalk gaps to provide a continuous sidewalk on at least one side of each residential street in the project area and to provide ADA access ramps at each intersection. The goal is to enhance pedestrian access to the heavily traveled bus route along Sixth Avenue. Along all the streets connecting directly to the Five Points intersection, pedestrian level lighting would be improved to increase visibility for pedestrians at night and provide a lit connection from the adjacent neighborhoods to the Five Points traffic signal and nearby bus stops.

In the final stage of the project, a gateway public art feature will enhance the intersection and provide neighborhood identity. The Five Points

Did You Know?: A Morsel of Armory Park History

Early in the 19th Century, a transcontinental railroad system was proposed to join the east and west coasts of the United States. Not until 1880 did the railroad service arrive in Tucson. While the Armory Park area was surveyed as part of the 1872 town plan, it was the construction of the railroad through Tucson that had the largest impact on the development of the area.

From 1880 until about 1920, the Armory Park residential area grew from the original Military Plaza to a progressive neighborhood made up mostly of prominent railroad men and their families. Originally centered around the Plaza, it sprang up primarily along Third and Fourth Avenues in the late 1880s, near to the railroad itself

In 1902, as the neighborhood expanded, portions of the Military Plaza were sold by the city and the remainder was converted into a public park with its new Carnegie Library. Additional development between Stone and Third Avenues occurred. By 1901, assorted buildings were constructed and had already reached 17th Street and by 1909 the area had been developed along 18th Street.

She will be accompanied by Jesse Soto, the City of Tucson's project manager and Luis Mena, the artist selected to create the art.

Sidewalk Liabilities

Who is responsible for fixing sidewalks in Tucson? Can I be liable for issues that are caused by sidewalks in poor repair? The answer may surprise you!

Tucson City Code requires "all owners or agents of owners with property abutting" a street or alley to keep public sidewalks immediately abutting their property in "good order and repair." Further, owners of property adjacent to these sidewalks may be liable to the city or for damages to persons or property of others caused by a failure to keep the sidewalk in good repair.

Permits to make repairs are required by the city but are available free of charge for basic repairs that do not change the grade, location or dimensions of the sidewalk. For those who have questions or concerns about obtaining a permit to repair the sidewalk in adjacent to their property, contact the city's Planning and Development Services at 791-5550.
